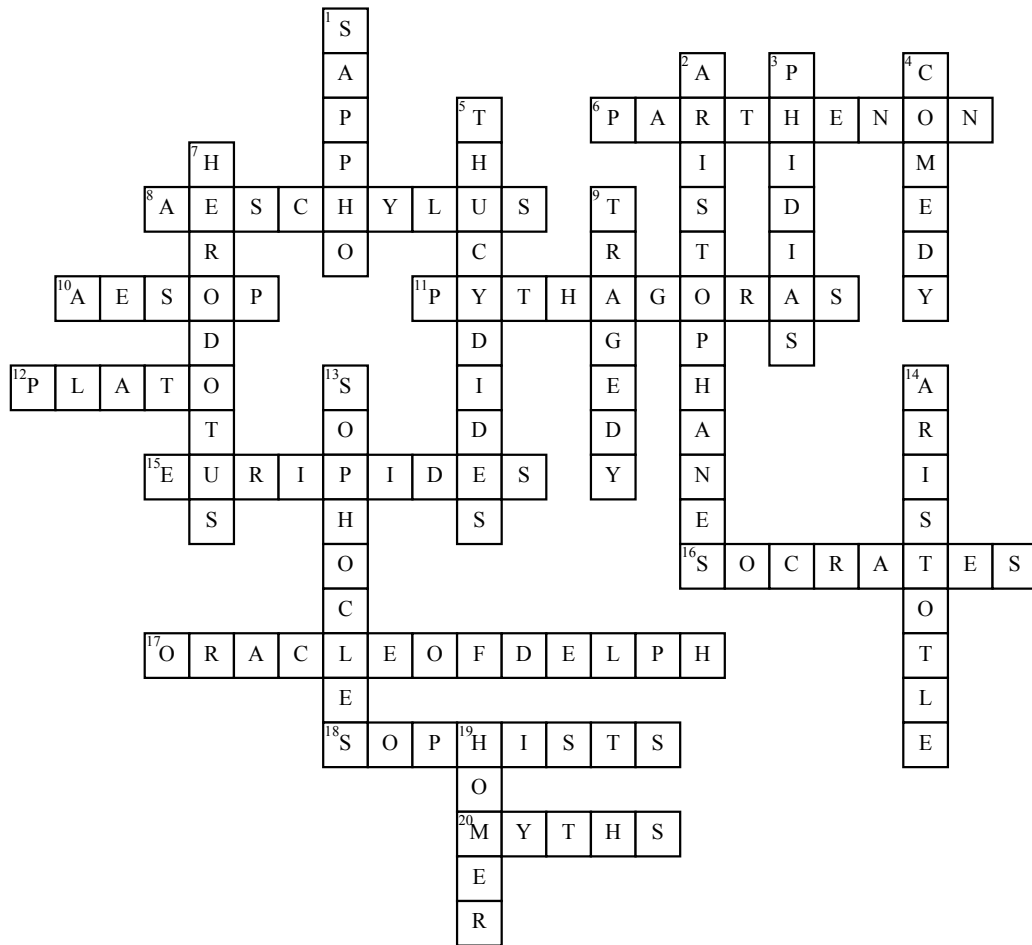


Culture of Ancient Greece

12. (428 - 348 B.C.) - Student of Socrates who wrote the "Republic".
15. (480 - 406 B.C.) - Wrote the play "Medea".
16. (469 - 399 B.C.) - Originally was a sculptor and developed the Socratic Method.

17. Most famous oracle, the oracle of Apollo.
18. Professional teachers in Greece who were payed.
20. Made up stories, usually including something supernatural, trying to explain natural events.

1. Example of a female poet and famous for lyrical poetry.
2. (446-386 B.C.) - Best known writer of greek comedies.
3. (500 - 430 B.C.) - Greek sculptor, painter, and architect.

4. A story that ends happily and usually includes lewd humor.
5. (460 - 395 B.C.) - Greatest historian of ancient world.
7. (484 - 425 B.C.) - Known as the Father of History.
9. A story with no happy ending and is typically about someone struggling to overcome something.
13. (496 - 406 B.C.) - Was a general who also wrote over 100+ plays.
14. (384 - 322 B.C.) - Best student of Plato and taught "The Golden Mean".
19. (750 B.C.) - Wrote the epics and was a famous greek poet.
