

- 2. The first common carrier railroad and the oldest railroad in the U.S.
- **6.** A railway with a track gauge narrower than 1,435 mm.
- **9.** A riverine carl-capable working boat, or a small to mid-sized recreational sailing yacht.
- **10.** Organized in 1835 and chartered to complete work on the James River Canal.

- **12.** Contained double-decker bunks and were heated and normally up to 100 feet long.
- **13.** Constructed as Virginia worked during the first half of the 19th century to improve transportation facilities in the western portion of the state.

- 1. Built to facilitate portage of shipments and freight by water
- **3.** The first major improved highway in the U.S built by the federal government.

- 4. A Class I railroad formed in 1869 in Virginia from several smaller Virginia railroads begun in the 19th century.
- **5.** A small or mid-sized railroad company that operates over a relatively short distance.
- **7.** A cargo boat with a flat bottom for use in shallow water.
- **8.** Class I railroad with headquarters in Norfolk, VA that most commonly hauls coal.
- **11.** A railroad gauge of 56.5 inches standard in the U.S., Britain, and many other parts of the world.
