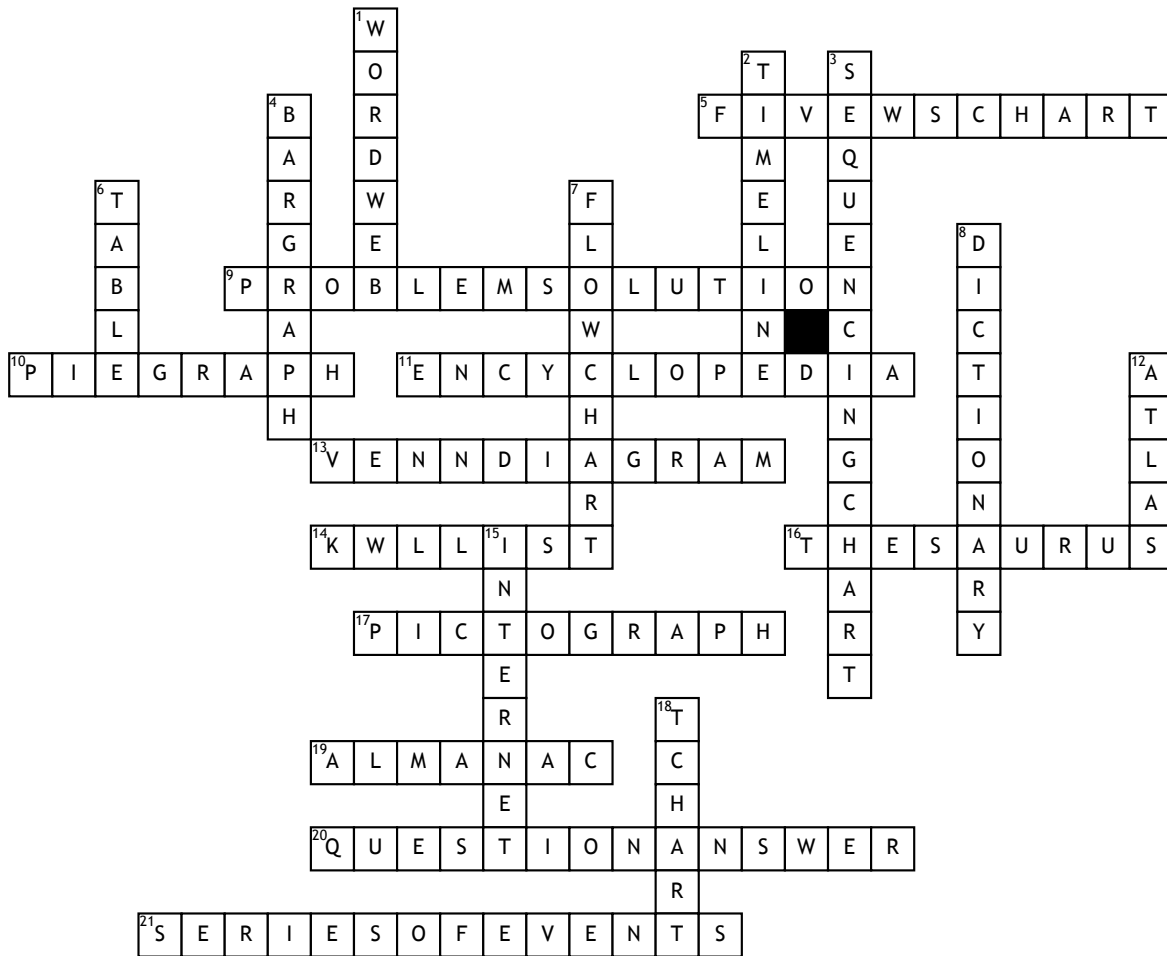


Types of Graphic Organizers

5. when the same questions are used that a good journalist would employ when interviewing someone for a news article
 9. similar to troubleshooting flowchart
 10. round illustration divided into slices totalling the whole (100%)
 11. alphabetical source of data on a myriad of people, places and things!
 13. invented in the late 1800's; used to compare two (or more) items through overlapping circles
 14. type of table that begins before the topic to be studied and is not complete until after study has finished
 16. printed or electronic source for opposites and similar words of those being investigated

17. communicates without any words; road signs use them

19. annually-updated source of meteorological, astronomical, cultural, geographical, and other data for locations around the world

20. uses a Q & A format to analyze and solve a problem

21. a type of sequencing often used when taking notes on a story read in class; tell what happened first, etc.

1. shows relationships among terms through rays leading out of a central theme

2. special type of flow chart that displays events in the order in which they happened

3. listing events in time (chronological) order

4. may be horizontal or vertical but components must always be the same width and distance apart

6. text box composed of headed rows and columns

7. a series of text boxes connected by rays to indicate the direction of "flow" of information

8. printed or electronic tool that tells the meaning, pronunciation, and etymology of words

12. a bound group of maps revealing maximum geographical and other data about a given area

15. relatively-new electronic means of sharing data 24 hours/day around the world

18. another comparing tool; so named due to its resemblance to a capital alphabet letter
