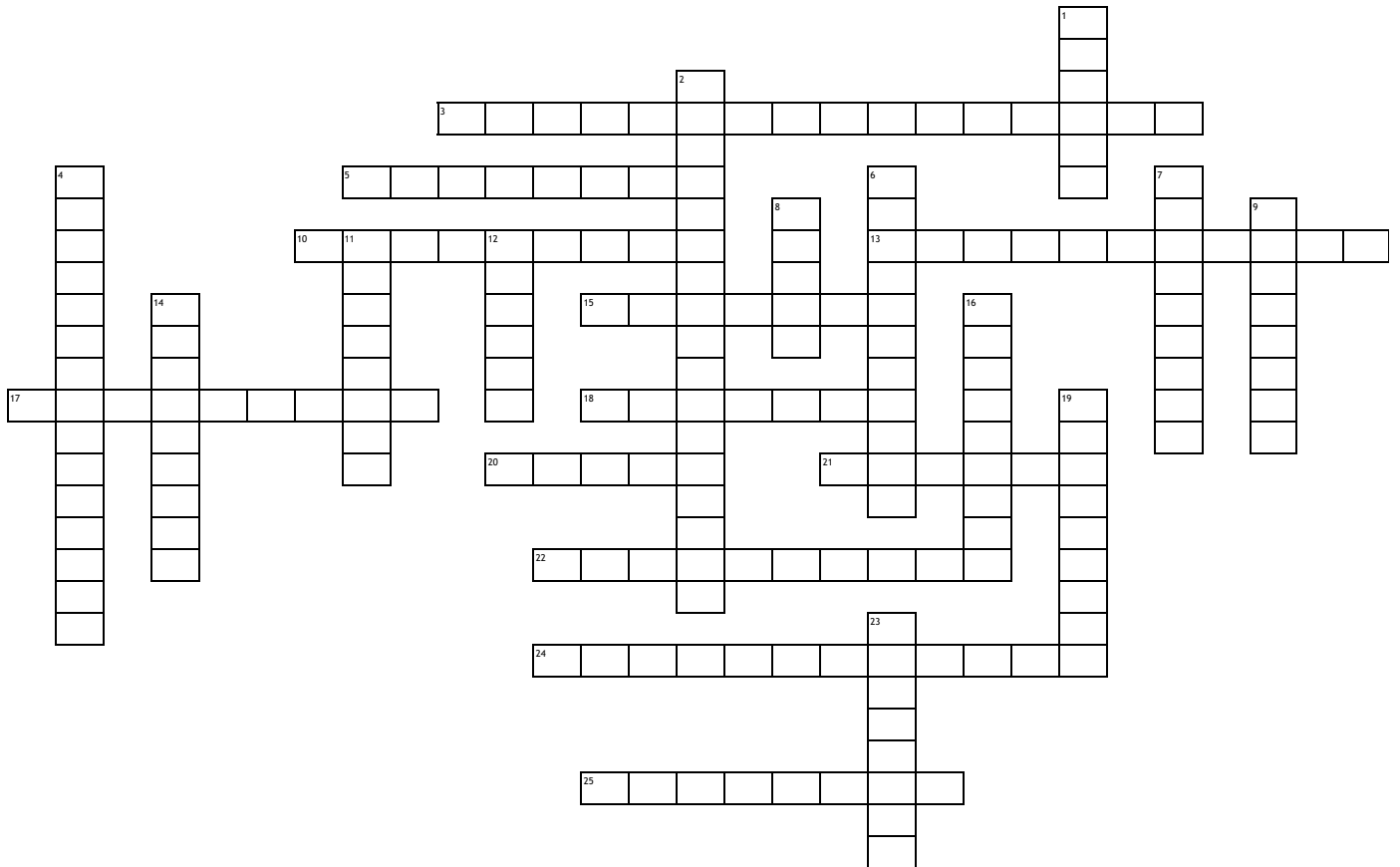

1. is a Latin epic poem, written by Virgil between 29 and 19 BC

6. He was the chief priest, lawgiver, judge, and the sole commander of the army.
7. was a Thracian gladiator who, along with the Gauls Crixus, Oenomaus, Castus and Gannicus, was one of the escaped slave leaders in the Third Servile War,
8. surrounded by the ruins of several important ancient government buildings at the center of the city of Rome.
9. a ruler with total power over a country, typically one who has obtained power by force.
