

7. In singles, the back boundary line. In doubles a line 2 ½ feet inside the back boundary line. The serve may not go past this line

9. Line perpendicular to the net that separates the left and right service courts.



10. The middle third of the court, halfway between the net and the back boundary line
11. Instrument used by the player to hit the shuttlecock.
13. Front third of the court, between the net and the short serve line.

15. A violation of the playing rules, either in serving, receiving or during play18. Exchange of shots while the shuttle is in play
