

3. Reading or speaking during a presentation without stumbling over words.

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8. Including visual components as a way to enhance one's presentation. Examples could be posters, charts, graphs, or PowerPoint presentations.

10. Looking at the individuals in the audience to get their attention and make a connection.

11. Giving a presentation or speaking without any time to prepare beforehand.

12. Moving one's body parts as a means of expression. Using gestures.

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1. Using nonverbal communication with your face to send a message while speaking.

2. Changing one's physical position while speaking. It can often help to keep the audience's attention, but if it's done too much it can be distracting. 4. Speaking clearly during a presentation so that all sounds and syllabus can be heard.

5. The term for the people who are watching or listening to a speaker.

6. Choosing appropriate vocabulary for the people who are listening or watching the speaker.
